

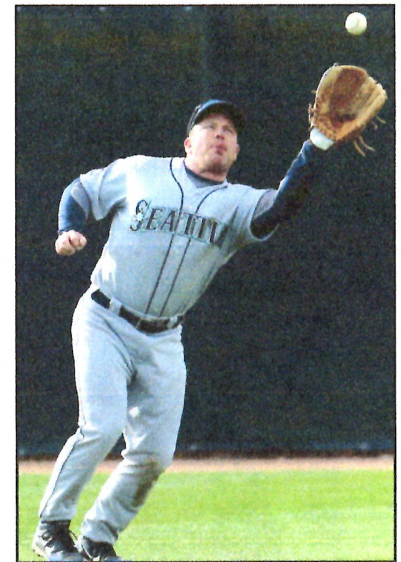

Big Balls dominate first day of play

The Big Balls were on display in all their offensive glory Saturday in the first day of play at the Oakland Athletics/Seattle Mariners Fantasy Camp.

The Balls slapped the Sons-a-Pitches 21-1 in their morning game, and staged a late rally to defeat the Multi Scor-gasm squad 12-8 in the afternoon.

"I'm very ecstatic with the way we played," Balls manager Shooty Babitt said. "I drafted eight guys who I hadn't seen, and they were better than advertised."

"Taking a line from Mike Moore, I really like our chances."

Reacting to his Sons-of-Pitches ineptitude, manager Brian Holman said, "We couldn't hit water today if we fell out of a submarine. In fact, I'm thinking

of changing our name from Sons-a-Pitches to No-Hit-Bitches."

The Mariners teams were 0-2 after the first day of play as Hitless in Seattle fell 5-1 to the A's Team Juiced.

The Juicers, managed by Jose Canseco and Mike Moore, split for the day as they lost in the morning to Scor-gasms 10-8.

"We started off the first game by walking 9 or 10 batters," Jose said. "Our pitching staff really struggled. And the double plays we hit into just killed us."

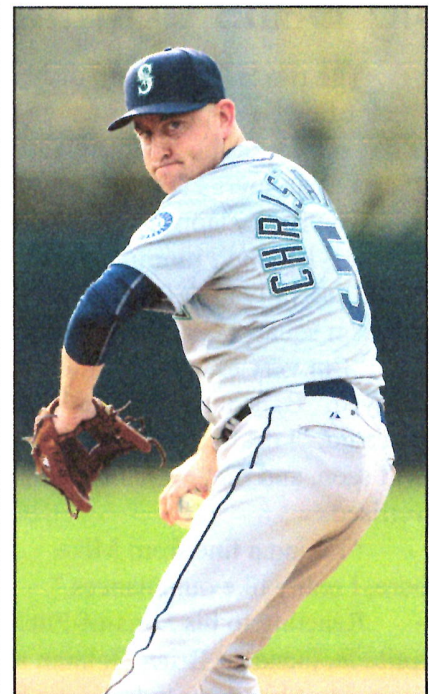
were victimized by bad baserunning that took them out of several innings offensively in their morning game.

Hitless in Seattle manager Keith Comstock declined to be interviewed, saying only that in naming his team, "my prophecy was fulfilled."

Hitless co-manager John Moses took a more optimistic view.

"Our offense didn't hit the ball very well," Moses conceded, "but we had good pitching. Our pitchers threw strikes and our defenders caught the ball. I think our offense is going to come around."
